Overdose Survivors Outreach Services

ODSOS is a partnership between Anne Arundel County Department of Health, Anne Arundel Medical Center (AAMC) and the University of Maryland Baltimore Washington Medical Center (BWMC) to provide outreach to opioid users and overdose survivors. A nurse coordinator connects survivors to a care coordinator and Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT) clinic, as appropriate. ODSOS strives to enroll all patients into an MAT program within 48 hours. MAT services include screening, methadone maintenance, individual and group counseling, and care by a physician. ODSOS funding has been provided by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration and the Maryland Behavioral Health Administration.

Peer Support Specialists

The ODSOS program uses peer support specialists to offer support and encourage access to treatment. The peer support specialists use knowledge from their life experiences to encourage participants to be responsible for their own recovery from opioid use or overdose.

Medication-Assisted Treatment

MAT is treatment for addiction that includes the use of medication along with counseling and other support. Treatment that includes medication is often the best choice for opioid addiction as it can reduce problems of withdrawal and craving. These changes can give the survivor the chance to focus on the lifestyle changes that lead to healthy living.

Opioid Overdose Response Training and Naloxone Kit

The Anne Arundel County Department of Health's Adult Addiction Program offers free training to community members on the use of naloxone, a prescription medicine to reverse an opioid overdose and prevent death. The training is for high-risk individuals and for family members, friends and the associates of any person who is using and at risk of overdosing on heroin or prescription pain medications. After completing the training, attendees will receive a free naloxone kit.
